Learning outcome: You can refine your topic in order to develop effective research questions and information seeking plans.

Directions: You will be searching for background information on a topic of your choice. It is best if you use a topic you are considering for your annotated bibliography or research paper. Follow the instructions on each page. If you have questions, ask your librarian or instructor for help.
